### MISSION



# Celebrating a Decade of Sangathan building and people's struggle



Through Atmashakti, we aim to enable the formation of mass based organization started with village level committees which is going upto the block and district level collectives. She also informed that Atmashakti Trust will work with these Sangathan in the state level with an objective to promote this process in 17 districts for 3 million households out of which 1 million households have alr4eady been reached out by the Sangathans", Ms. Kashyap told.

In July 2009, with 60 field activists, the intervention begun in 5 districts of Odisha with the support of local Sangathans. In the journey of our 10 years (2019), Atmashakti Trust has been working with 21 regional Sangathans and two state level alliances namely: Odisha Sramajeebee Manch and Mahila Sramajeebee Manch, Odisha which are working with more than 10 lakh families of 9484 villages in 798 Gram Panchayats under 75 blocks of 15 districts in the state.

Addressing the gathering, Executive Trustee Ruchi Kashyap Said "the past 10 years has been an incredible and vibrant journey and we have witnessed many challenges, limitations along with major milestones and impact in the journey.

As an organization, we mobilise the most marginalised communities living in the remotest part of the state on their rights and entitlements by building strong people's organization, an ideation to form them into collectives. M.M. Singh, a renowned philanthropist and Managing Trustee of Atmashakti Trust informed that Atmashakti was started to create awareness on rights and entitlements of the most deprived and marginalised section of the society with an emphasis on Adivasi and Dalit communities. He also emphasised the need to improve the life standard of the rural people through proper facilities in health and education, employment guarantee, safe drinking water and commitment to upholding efforts to ensure people's empowerment.

Attending the celebration event, renowned economist and former Finance Minister of Odisha Mr Panchanan Kanungo, who was felicitated in the event for his solidarity said "ensuring common people's rights and entitlements is a challenge. However, we should appreciate Atmashakti's relentless efforts in advancing the lives of Dalit and Tribals who are often being sidelined from the developmental priorities of the government. There should be more people's collectives, Sangathans who come up and raise people's issues to have a scalable impact on the lives of the people".

In the concluding event, renowned social activists Pradip Pradhan, Manas Jena, Manas Mishra, Sandeep Pattnaik, Senior Journalist Mr Ravi Das and many other dignitaries were felicitated for their long term association and solidarity with Atmashakti's decade long journey. In this event, Mr Arun Prasad Dihudi, Gopinath Majhi, Pravat Kumar Sahu, Panchanan Pradhan and other senior members of Atmashakti Trust shared their journey with the organization.



### **Key Events-**Jansathi Sammilani

Janasathi Sammelan is an annual congregation of team members and Sangathan members of the organization to meet, participate in group activities, exchange ideas and reflect on new learnings and avenues.

This year, we organised our Sammelan in Balangir, Odisha which was hosted by our local ally Lok Unnati Sangathan. More than 300 team members and Sangathan members were present in a 5-days intensive team gathering. Janasathi Sammelan is also considered as a window point to debate and dialogue on the current socio-political scenario of the state and review organizational plans to take forward Sangathan activities.

During this event, the Leader of the Opposition party of Odisha Legislative Assembly Mr Narasingh Mishra, Former Lok Sabha Member Mr Bhakta Charan Sahu, educationists and leaders of civil society joined and shared their views on the need for a collective effort to mainstream marginalised communities in the development process.











### **Consultation on CEDAW**

The government must take actions on the constitutional, legislative and administrative reforms that have been adopted by our country in response to CEDAW recommendations to eliminate discrimination against women as well as to prevent and address gender-based violence against women, said a group of women rights activists and grassroots level women leaders who congregated in a workshop on Convention on Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), held in Bhubaneswar today. The workshop was organised by Atmashakti Trust, Odisha Shramajeebee Manch and Mahila Shramajeebee Manch, Odisha, the people collectives which work towards socio-economic and political empowerment of the people, especially for Tribals, Dalits and women. "Orthodox and brutish male-dominated family systems, and the tradition of patriarchal inheritance have shored up the idea that women are mere 'possessions'. All forms of violence against women must be stopped and collective actions to abate this is the need of the hour", said Ms Shanti Bhoi, President, Mahila Shramajeebi Manch, Odisha.



### **Key Events**-Setting up Community Resource Centre

On the eve of Gandhi Jayanti, a first-ever Community Resource Centre (CRC) was set up in Karlapita village of Balangir district. More than 300 people from Karlapita and neighbouring villages witnessed the event.

Members of Lok Unnati Sangathan, our ally in Balangir have set up the Community Resource Centre in Karlapita which will be fully managed by the community. It has been set up to provide a learning platform for the aspiring youths and people of this Panchayat as the reading habits among youths are declining and rural people find it hard to access information on various government schemes, benefits and on their rights and entitlements.

Before this, the Sangathan organised some sports competition such as Kabaddi, Puchi (played in a squatting position) to keep alive traditional rural games. However, the Pitha (a type of rice cake) was a unique showcase in the competition where women from Self-help groups made varieties of Pitha and the best of them were awarded.

Zilla Parishad Member Mr Satya Narayan Bhoi, Balangir Sadar Block Chairmain Mr Golap Bagh, Sub-Collector of Balangir Mr Pritibas Seth, BDO of Balangir Block, Ramadatta Bhoi were present at the event and applauded the efforts of the Sangathan in raising people's issues and ensuring people's rights and entitlement in the district. Among others, the District President of Lok Unnati Sangathan Ms Sumitra Rana and Secretary Ms Susama Puta and representatives of OSM and MSMO were present and facilitated the event.







### Honing Skills Mentorship training

The idea of the mentorship training is to mentor a group of team members placed in various positions (who alsovhave the potential to influence a large number of other team members or replicate) on different skill sets which includes management skills, life skills and brain mapping skills, design thinking, etc. in 6 months.

During this period, we developed a module on mentoring by recording processes of different stages. Subsequently, we also have need done assessment of all the selected mentees by conducting a one-to-one discussion.

In the mentorship programme, 33 mentees have been selected and are being provided skill based training on leadership building, management skills, life skills, mental health and the programme has been being taken up by 5 sub-mentors and one Chief Mentor.





### Honing Skills Management training

Management training has been designed to equip our management staffs to expertise on various skills which will help them to manage their portfolio work efficiently and to learn skills to upgrade their current learnings, as they do involve in strategic planning, monitoring and team work in the organization.

There are 27 management trainees who have been guided and provided trainings on effective thinking, financial planning, developing tools and framework, data management, leadership development, self care, life skills and so on.

### Livelihood campaign-Amari Gaon re Ama Jeebika

As various study reports reveal, people of Western Odisha, especially from Nuapada and Balangir, migrate due to the lack of enough nonagricultural jobs in the villages. So, the villagers in search of job in the lean season migrate to neighbouring states to support their family with an extra source of income. However, for most of them, migration has been a terrifying and disheartening. To address this issue, we kick started a two-month campaign drive from 22nd September in Balangir, Kalahandi and Nuapada districts to deter illegal/forced migration and to facilitate process to ensure livelihood opportunity in the locality.

We have covered more than 70 migration prone villages of Nuapada and Balangir districts under "Amari Gaon re Ama Jeebika" through conducting Padayatras, village meetings and meeting already migrant and potential migrant families, youths and sensitising them about the the plethora of adversities related to distressed and illegal migration.

Shiksha Swasthya Ama Adhikar, Jabab Dia "Mo Sarkar" was a month-long public campaign on education and health coordinated by the people's collectives Odisha Shramajeebee Manch (OSM) and Mahila Shramajeebi Manch, Odisha (MSMO), which is aimed at educating public about their rights and entitlements and to influence policymakers on ensuring implementation of Right to Education Act and ensuring healthcare for all in the state. The campaign targeted to tag #Mo Sarkar initiative the objective of which is to provide service with dignity to the people who are coming to government offices for different purposes with a 5T approach so that demands from the communities are heard and redressed with immediate effect.

This month-long campaign has witnessed active participation of nearly 10000 people across the state representing from Sangathans, Civil Society organizations, PRI Members, MLAs/MPs and other like-minded individuals. The first phase of the campaign started within respective districts till 14th November through Bike Rally and second phase of the campaign through Cycle Rally where delegates from the districts moved towards the capital city Bhubaneswar to attend the culminating events and putting forth their demands before the government.

#### Agriculture


The Agriculture Intervention was initiated with a goal to promote organic farming as a more eco-friendly, beneficial, sustainable and affordable option to the poor and marginalized farmers, with long term benefits reflecting in their health and finances. It was started in 2009 in Harbhanga Block and now covers 33 Blocks in 12 Districts of Odisha. The current team comprises of 15 staffs who take care of the field level implementation, along with a State Manager who is looking after the overall process, hand holding and providing technical support to the entire team.

Highlights of our Intervention:

- Rs. 700 benefited to the Farmers through organic process in comparison to nonorganic
- farming
- 35 nos. of School reports card have been prepared during the survey Health & amp; Education
- 15 nos. of Sub-center report card have been prepared
- 02 nos. of Primary Health Center (PHC) report card have been prepared
- 117 nos. of wall writing and 325 nos. of street play undertaken towards spreading awareness
- 2048 nos. of Postcard have been dropped as people's grievances Krishi Vikas Mela:
- Rs.1,05,000 mobilized for the Mela
- 270 nos. of people across the District participated in the Mela

#### Impact

- Creating awareness among the farmers leading to an increase in the numbers of participating farmers
- KVV members are now conducting the demonstration of organic stuffs in their own villages and nearby villages
- PRI members have been participating in our rallies, campaigns and different events
- Government officials like PEO, GRS & amp; AAO have participated in our programmes and in the ventilating of different schemes and provisions



#### Health

To cater to the unmet healthcare needs and to facilitate the eradication of malnutrition among underserved populations, we started our health-kit intervention project in 4 blocks (Baliguda, Daringbadi, Koragrah and Tumudibandh) of Kandhamal districts. Apart from that, we are also helping people to access benefits from the existing government schemes related to food & nutrition and village development, safe drinking water, activating local health institutions and ICDS centres, promoting Nutritional Kitchen Garden in the backyard and awareness generation activities on encouraging girl child education, malnutrition and reproductive health of women and adolescent girls. Highlights of our Intervention:

- Till date, 61 Health Kits have been formed in both Tumudibandh & amp; Kotagarh Block of
- Kandhamal District, Odisha. Due to this, people got medicines at their doorsteps, were able
- to save money, awareness increased amongst the villagers and Swasthya Sathis became
- aware of different health schemes & amp; programmes.
- In consultations with Sangathan members, 108 Swasthya Sathis were selected in both blocks.
- As of now, 122 Swasthya Sathis have been trained on Health Kit management in both blocks (60 From Kotagarh & amp; 62 from Tumudibandh)
- Total 1671 family covered by 61 Health Kit (798 from Kotagarh & 873 from Tumudibandh)

- 4472 from Tumudibandh)

- levels.



• For the formation of Health Kit, team member generated Rs.76,410/through collection of contributions (Rs.41660/- from Kotagarh & amp; Rs.34750/- from Tumudibandh respectively)

• 61 Health Kit covered 8361 populations (3889 from Kotagarh & amp;

• During the period, April 2019 to March 2020, a total of 1254 people benefited from the Health Kit. Out of 1254, 591 were males, 469 were females and 194 were children. 673 people were from Kotagarh and 581 people were from Tumudibandh.

• 228 VLC were formed in both blocks after which, people identified & addressed their local issues, giving solidarity support to other villagers.

• Awareness level developed on different schemes, programmes and the role of government officials. 4 GP level committees were also formed in both the blocks. As of now 2 Block committees have been formed which meet regularly as per requirement to highlight different issues at block

- Through Wall Writing, sangathan members tried to create awareness among the people. 241 wall writings were made in different strategic locations in both blocks on different issues.
- Keeping in mind the issues of malnutrition, sangathan members identified 80 households in both blocks and extended technical support and guidance towards developing a Nutritional Kitchen garden in their backyard. Through this intervention, people became sensitive towards nutrition rich diversity foods and interest level increased to promote the same. 30% people added green vegetables in their food, they also incorporated wild edible fruits like "DIMIRI" in their diet and were able to save 20% expenses towards their food.
- Through Herbal Kitchen Garden awareness level developed amongst the community towards the usage of different herbal plants. During this period, sessions and demonstrations were conducted in 45 villages on how to make herbal medicines.
- Awareness sessions on Hand wash were conducted in 26 schools in both blocks, which were attended by children, school teachers and parents.
- Organized 4 Hata demonstrations programmes in both blocks. Through this, we were able to reach more than 600 individuals and share the different activities of the sangathans.
- Organized 7 Village Level Health camps in consultations with the local SC staff which were attended by adolescent girls & amp; women. During the health camp, hemoglobin levels of the participants were tested and a counselling session was organized by the team members.





#### Impact

- As of now we have a strong presence in 186 villages in 10 Gram Panchayats in both blocks.
- We had Submitted 15 applications to CDPO Tumudibandh & Kotagada to regularise Anganwadi centres out of which all 15 centers were regularized through the efforts of the sangathan
- members, which further helped them to access benefits from the schemes such as THR food, regularization of pre-school centers & VHND and regular home visits were ensured.
- Drinking water issues were resolved in 30 villages out of 48 applications after the interventions by block officials.
- Sangathan members placed a request letter MO to regularize ANM Center in Kotagarh block after which ANM started visiting the villages on a regular basis.
- A Rally programme on electricity issue was organized by the Sangathan member in both the blocks, at the end of which a demand letter was submitted. Within a month of submitting the letter, the following issues were resolved; fluctuation of voltage issues resolved in 13 villages, 9 villages were newly electrified



#### **Centre for Learning and Development**

The primary idea of Centre for Learning & amp; Development (CLD) is to build a different learning process aiming towards a pedagogy from below. The CLD would function as a learning centre for both activists as well as non-activists. It would engage people from different walks of life such as activists, community leaders, community members and others interested in such learning process. It is a strategy for creating knowledge characterised by taking action to realise just relationships that transform unequal power structures in our personal, social, cultural, political, environmental, spiritual, and economic lives. This could be accomplished by linking critical reflection to activism by creating opportunities to connect the action to self-reflection, selfdiscovery, and the creation and comprehension of values, skills, and knowledge.

The primary goal of CLD from the margins is to assist the learners to emerge as responsible citizens. In such a circumstance, the learner should be provided with the opportunity, skills, tools, and strategies to be active agents of change. It is a creative learning and educational practice in which participants engage in a set of learning activities that help them understand themselves as capable of effecting change for social justice, distributive justice, sharing of values and a balance of ecology.

#### Birsa Bahini

Capacity building fosters a sense of ownership and empowerment, so that community partners gain greater control over their own future development. And in our work, we felt that communities and grassroot leaders need to build up their skills, processes and resources to enable the committee members and potential leaders at all levels (Villages, Gram Panchayat, Block and District) towards a life with dignity by continuously engaging in a people led empowerment process through a right based approach to access constitutional rights and other entitlements.

Thus, Birsa Bahini was formed to support the capacity building process in the grass root level through various levels of intervention with different strategies. Now, Birsa Bahini functions under training and capacity building unit of the organization and has a team in 16 districts and in the state level to take up capacity building programmes.

OSM and MSMO are state-level apex bodies of 21 local sangathan (people's collectives) in Odisha which work to create awareness among communities and capacitate them to collectively take actions to access their rights and entitlements and anchor for relevant policy changes through advocacy, campaign, networking and building solidarity networks. Similarly, Sonbhadra Vikas Sangathan was formed in 2015 in Uttar Pradesh to help marginalised communities access to their rights and entitlements as well as to resolve local issues that concern them the most. The Sangathan emerged as a social force to educate, and empower communities and facilitate them to take collective actions.

### Odisha Shramajeebee Mancha, Mahila Shramajeebee Mancha and Sonbhadra Vikash Sangathan, UP

#### Impact

- 80 new roads constructed/developed in our operational areas due to the sangathan demand

Key focus areas of intervention are Formation of People's collective, Livelihood, Women Empowerment, Rural Education, Food and Nutritional Security, Training & amp; Orientation, Plantation under Hara Bhara Tariya and Cultural Group formation through UFAAN

#### Highlight of intervention

• As a result of Sangathan efforts, 380 village committee, 114 Gram Panchayat committee, and 2 block committee meeting organised

#### Education

- Identification of drop-out children-298(from 52 schools-25 Nagwa and 27 Chatra), Admission done of drop-out children-93


On the day of conclusion 300 village leaders attended the rally from the district headquarter to office of BDO and submitted the memorandum.

#### Impact-MGNREGA-

- 1965 households (1140 from Nagwa and 825 from Chatra) have got the late payment (FY 2018-19)

#### **Resource Mobilization**

### Bhubaneswar Bikash Sangathan

Bhubaneswar Vikas Sangathan germinated with an aim to establish a long term sustainable people's organization in Bhubaneswar slums.with a targeted reach out to 97505 families in 362 slums under Bhubaneswar Municipality Corporation area. The purpose of the formation of the sangathan was to replicate our sangathan approach model in selected urban areas and continue to deliver services to the marginalised and deprived communities.

#### **Highlights of intervention**

- Meeting at the slum level: Introductory presentation meeting on BBS concept, issues identification, sangathan formation, sharing of information on Food Security provisions, identification of key active leaders & preparation of adhoc committee. During this period, we visited 95 slums with a total of 21212 HHs in the Northern zone of the urban slum.
- Ad hoc Committee Formation: 80 Adhoc committees were formed in 80 slums and in each, Committee President, Secretary and other key members were selected with the consent of other slum dwellers. We discussed their role and responsibilities and the importance of the ad hoc committee.
- Birsamunda Jayanti celebration: To encourage the school students and women, we celebrated Birsamunda Jayanti in two tribal slums i.e like Tuyu Gutu A and Tuyu Gutu B. In total, 30 students from Class 1 8 and 16 women from the slums participated in the programme. We also organized different competitions like Drawing/ Quiz competition for children, and puchi competition for the women. From both the slums, about 40 slum dwellers were present to encourage the participants.
- 2154 HHs surveys have been completed
- 26 committee members, 54 children and 29 women from Bhubaneswar slums took part in our state level programmes during Siksha swasthya Adhikar campaign





### Sangathan Intervention Bhubaneswar Bikash Sangathan

#### Impact

- Visited 14 wards, 95 slums under BMC.
- Organised introductory meeting to explain the concept of Bhubaneswar Bikash Sangathan in 95 slums of Ward 14 in the Northern Zone.
- Slum Level Women Committees were formed in 80 slums and selection of President and Secretary was done with the consent of other members of the committee.
- Issues identified from 95 slums like poor infrastructures (tarpaulin roof), IHHL, sanitation, drainage, kachha road, drinking water, ration card, pension.
- ssue addressed at the Ward Level i.e. issue of new Ration Card for 27 households in Ward No 5 & 9. After our interventions, a total of 18 old people from Ward 10, 11 & 14 got their pension which was pending with the government.
- Solved drinking water and concern departments.

Networking with different stakeholders: Strong relationship developed with various CBOs, Corporators, Ward Officers, Community organizers and NGOs Mobilization of food & essential commodities during COVID-19: During the critical lockdown period we mobilized ration, grocery and cooked food for 1676 poor households from 16 slums and 10 wards under Bhubaneswar Bikash Sangathan in the Northern Zone.

We also mobilized support in the form of grocery and essential commodities from YUVA and Matrushakti Foundation for a group of 6 physically challenged persons from Phulbani district who were stuck in Keshari Basti Ward 47.

#### Berhampur Bikash Sangathan

#### **Puri Intervention**

With the help of local administration, the team members of Atmashakti had a meeting with the collector, Puri & other district officials. After that A team of Atmashakti Trust visited Berhampur Gram Panchayat, one of the most cyclone affected areas of Krushnaprasad block in Puri district. In this context Atmashakti team had three times meeting with collector and PD, DRDA. There are a total of 1238 families out of which about 750 families live on an island in the middle of the Chilika Lake and the mouth into the Bay of Bengal is only around 2 kilomeeters away.

Looking at the trail of devastation and acute sufferings of the people, Atmashakti realized that it is extremely crucial to help people get back their livelihood which has been greatly affected by Cyclone Fani and other Restoration works.

To know the extent of damage and to assess the need of the people affected by Cyclone Fani, Atmashakti conducted a baseline survey in five 5 villages of Berhampur Gram Panchayat. The report revealed that restoration of livelihood and other developmental works are the priority of this Gram Panchayat. Hence mutually a decision had been taken that following are the key areas those are needs the immediate attention.

Priority areas of intervention that were included are: Livelihood restoration through mobilising OLM and other livelihood sectors aswell as from organizational support,

Construction of new House under PMAY & other housing schemes, Ensuring Drinking water by engaging RWSS, School infrastructure and quality education and Accessible healthcare facilities Banking facilities.

### **Success story** Kandhamal's youth warriors on mission to spread awareness on COVID 19

With the pandemic comes the stigma, superstitions and distress about the disease among people. Meet 10 youth volunteers of Atmashakti Trust and Jeebika Suraksha Manch of Kandhamal who have taken on mission to inform communities about the COVID-19 Pandemic. To oust the myths and provide a basic scientific understanding of the public health measure behind the endemic, these group members drive their way to remote villages everyday to inform people about social distancing, handwashing and the importance of wearing masks. The locals are all praise for these youth groups as they have already covered 224 villages of 11 Gram Panchayats under Tumudibandha and Kotagarh Block where they are educating people about the Corona pandemic and helping SHGs to distribute foods to the people in their houses.

In these villages where basic amenities are hardly fulfilled and we are leaving no stones unturned to provide the government benefits to the people, the noble gestures of these youths are praiseworthy, says Mrs Basanti Behera Majhi, Sarpanch of the Jubaguda Gram Panchayat.

"Neither the villagers were wearing masks nor were washing hands or maintaining social distancing until we informed them about the hazard of the Coronavirus. Through the confusion, stress and worry that COVID 19 causes naturally, we needed to contribute to our society", said Madhab Majhi who himself is a partially physically challenged but a frontline warrior of the group of the organization.

We are spreading awareness on social distancing, handwashing, importance of wearning masks and helping Self-help Group's efforts to provide food at doorsteps in over 224 villages of 11 Gram Panchayats of Tumudibandha and Kotagada blocks and not only this, we are also spending from our own pockets to help needy and distress families where government benefits are not yet reached, concludes Puspanjali Kar, another group member and who works a Janasathi with Jeebika Suraksha Mancha, Kandhamal.



### **Success story** Now, Sasmita's family is ensured of 3-months ration

Sasmita lives with her family in Kudigunja, a village under Daringbadi block of Kandhamal district, Odisha. Both Sasmita and her husband Aruna work as daily wage earners to manage their households. But as the pandemic induced lockdown was imposed, they lost their jobs. Over uncertainty, they knocked many doors for help to feed their family but remained unsuccessful. It was Rashmita, our Janasathi in that area who met Sasmita's family and witnessed their ordeals. Very soon, together with our ally Jeebika Suraksha Mancha in Kandhamal, Sasmita's story was tweeted consistently, tagging the State Food and Consumer Welfare Minister, Chief Minister's Office and the district administration of Kandhamal, to seek action in this regard. Within a week, the district administration took action upon our Twitter posts and provided rations to Sasmita's family. "I had been fighting for rations. But everybody turned a deaf ear to my request. Now, with the help of Jeebika Suraksha Mancha and Atmashakti Trust, we got rations for at least 3-months. I am grateful to the Sangathan members for their timely help, especially during COVID-19 pandemic period", says Ms Sasmita.

### How the distribution of dry ration helped Sudha Devi to feed her kids


With a hope to make a living, Sudha Devi migrated to Noida from a remote village of Jharkhand. It was difficult for her to take care of two kids in the village where there was hardly any sustained livelihood opportunities.

Raising children as a single woman was already a challenge. And the lockdown posed another challenge as the family had to struggle with the acute food shortage. It was a crisis within the crisis for Sudha Devi.

She was working as a domestic help to many houses in sector 44 in Noida where she was staying. It has been five years that she has been taking care of her kids all alone after her husband passed away. The lockdown made her more helpless. She had no savings. So, she was even unable to buy grocery or refill a gas cylinder.

"When I had almost lost faith in humanity as there was no support rendered to us, Atmashakti provided us the muchneeded rations which enabled me to feed my family", tells Sudha Devi.

### 45 pc elementary schools have no library: Survey

AROUND 53 per cent schools do not have electricity, while 45 per cent schools lack library facility for students at elementary level in the State, revealed a survey report released on Friday.

A joint survey of Odisha Shramajeebee Mancha and Mahila Shramajeebee Mancha claimed that of the 960 schools inspected in 17 districts last

month, 450 don't have electricity connection. Similarly, 437 schools also do not have library facility.

The study findings also revealed that more than 70 per cent schools do not have toilet facility for children with special need.

A total of 835 primary and upper primary schools, which account to 85.93 per cent of the schools surveyed, have no Computer-aided Learning Laboratory.

What surprises more is that mid-day-meal is not being provided to children in 98 (10 pc) schools. School Management Committees are not functioning in 322 (33.5 pc) schools.

POOR EDUCATION INFRA

The irregularities in schools do not end here. The survey report stated that as per Right to Education norms these schools should have 5,976 classrooms. But, they are running short by a whopping 3,481 classrooms.

Though State Government asks school authorities to ensure that students are not allowed to go outside school campus between 10 am and 4 pm. around 725 out of 960 sample schools didn't have boundary wall. Drinking water facility is also not available in 238 (25 per cent) schools.

Not just schools. The health establishments are also in a shambles in the State, claimed the report.

It revealed that of the 216 Sub-Health Centres, 185 are bereft of toilet facility while 97

children in accessing quality edu cation own after 10 years of iminformentation of Right in Education Act. They have takened their own dream schools that need aneern ment attention to actualise the needs of the children.

The children also apprised Pradhan about lack of infrastrue ture teachers' absenteetant school dosure and other issues. After meet ing these children Pristhan said "Education is a fundamental right of the children after RTE was anarted. Their dream about their school is innovative. The commission will direct the state governare seailable in their schools."

The Commission has issued the notice on the basis of a petition filed by the Odisha Parent's Federation (OPF). The Federation had alleged that general category students were enrolled under Economically Weaker Sections and isadvintaged Group quota in DAV schools across Oclisito during 2018-19and 2029-20. The Commission has asked Sateathy to reply by December 20.
