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
Access to water is not a privilege, it's a human right!

In Odisha, people face an acute water crisis. 56% of households in Odisha do not have a piped water connection, according to the data of the Panchayati Raj and drinking water department, despite the State Government's claim to provide water connections to all rural households by March 2024. Subsequently, the drinking water supply project is yet to see the light in as many as 160 blocks of the state which is another worrying trend.

Water woes are much more rampant in remote villages than elsewhere. People walk miles to collect water for family needs. The repercussion of lack of access to water is not only limited to the domestic front – it leads to other negative implications such as the dropout of girls from schools and life-long health issues for women.



As the entire state was reeling under a heat wave in Mid-April and May, it caused water scarcity in the rural areas and those who dwell on hilly terrains.

The lack of available water infrastructures such as bore-wells, and tube wells, added with wizening of ponds and water streams, worsened the situation. Keeping that need in mind, we kick-started a state-wide campaign, "Ama Pain Pani" (Water For Us), to help ensure access to safe drinking water for all households in targeted 1000 villages across 12 districts of Odisha.

Updates from the ground (April-June)



To ensure the formation of e-Sangathan in targeted areas, the building of a community #warrior cadre has started in 900 villages of Odisha through community meetings, engaging with schools, colleges, and other institutions. Conducted orientations of #warrior

Nutritional Kitchen Garden (NKGs)

We could facilitate the free distribution of vegetable seeds to 4525 households from the Odisha government's Horticulture department to the marginalised and resource-poor communities in Kandhamal to help them grow Nutritional Kitchen Garden (NKG) in our effort to fight Malnutrition by ensuring their access to healthy and nutritious food.



To promote organic farming in Boudh, Deogarh, Gajapati and Nabarangapur districts, we have conducted massive field demonstrations on organic farming processes for farmers

Volunteer Boot Camps

· Organized boot camps and area wise group meetings with volunteers in Malkangiri, Rayagada, Kandhamal and Koraput district of Odisha to start process of the volunteer network. During this period, we organised 14 Shivirs (Boot Camp) where 377 volunteers participated



Livelihood through

- Late payment of 396 villages under MGNREGA were identified out of which issues of 126 villages resolved.
- 17549 job card holders have been allocated work during this period

Honing Skills -improving work efficiency

The objective of our training and capacity building unit is to assist team members and other learners from Sangathan (partner collectives) to gain knowledge and develop perspectives on socio-economic and political aspects of development by upgrading their knowledge base, skills, tools and techniques. In the last quarter, we have undertaken several training on different subjects and topics as a part of our ongoing skill up-gradation initiative.



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Model Chatashali- a supplementary education initiative

Starting in mid-August 2021, the Mo Chatashali initiative achieved many milestones in policy impact and improving learning outcomes among children.

Major Milestones:

- Provided learning support to over 0.10 million children through Mo Chatashali learning centers
- No dropout among students in areas where we opened Mo Chatashali centers
- Regular meetings and engagement with SMC members and parents during the process helped them to know their roles and responsibilities and children's Right to Education (RTE).
- Received recognition from Odisha State Commission for Protection of Child Rights as a successful education model
- A learning recovery program was initiated by the Odisha government, a model similar to Mo Chatashali, for implementation in the state as a post-covid education initiative.
- The mental health of children, which constituted one of our important recommendations in the study report "Bridging the Gap," was included in the school curriculum of the state government. To read our study report, please click <u>here.</u>

However, our journey does not stop here. Now, we are embarking on establishing Model Chatashali, an improved and tailor-made supplementary education model in 9 districts (Kandhamal, Kalahandi, Koraput, Rayagada, Malkangiri, Gajapati, Mayurbhanj, Sundergarh, Keonjhar) to cater to the learning needs of children in rural Odisha. Upon successful implementation, we would engage CSOs, policymakers, researchers, and the government for replication/adoption of this model. Atmashakti *Call for Action* 2022

The Ranikhet Call for Action, our annual team event, came as a gift for all at Atmashakti since the COVID-19 pandemic had brought travel and tourism to a standstill for the last two years. So, we took the golden opportunity and brought our Odisha and New Delhi team to Ranikhet, Uttarakhand. However, we changed our approach from a retreat to a call for action event, accepting that our endeavors in a post-pandemic world would be different.

The week-long event from 11th to 16th April had learning sessions, group presentations, assessment of skill sets, and most of all, preparing a broad work strategy for 2022-23 of our organization. All our team members also took a self and collective pledge for this year to take up roles to contribute to community development.

The Call for Action event honored team members who worked exceptionally hard during the pandemic, keeping the organization's mandates and values at the top.

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Our Impact- reaching the most marginalized

01

- Our extensive awareness outreach program on drinking water schemes & provisions reached over 60000 people
- Water-related issues of 832 villages were resolved through the safe drinking water campaign "Ama Pain Pani."

02

- Policy impact: the Odisha government announced a Learning recovery program, a model similar to our "Mo Chatashali initiatives
- Formed 12 district-level Advocacy committees to strengthen grassroots advocacy to support socio-economic and political issues of people for grievance redressal and policy level changes

03

- Trained over 200 newly elected PRI members on using social media to solve governance issues, and 1040 PRI members trained on their roles and responsibilities.
- Created a network of over 5000 volunteers across the state through volunteer boot camps (shivirs) to develop a support system at the local level and increase the social network between communities and neighborhoods.

04

- As a result of our mobilization, 7634 Sangathan members participated in Gram Sabha from 92 GPs and ensured the adoption of water and MGNREGA issues in Gram Sabha resolutions.
- Our community intervention initiative helped create assets under MGNREGA such as PMAY, farm pond, Soak-pit, dug well, land development, and school boundary worth 20 million INR.

- 1175 selected active farmers from our agriculture intervention areas are helping other farmers to adopt organic farming through field demonstrations.
- As a result of our extensive awareness outreach, 25278 farmers have adopted organic farming practices in 4 operational districts.

- Collecting evidence on the rejection of Individual as well as Community Forest rights of Scheduled Tribes and traditional forest dwellers
- Expedite the process of approving community land claims by forest dwellers and forest workers
- Engaging with district and state government officials, Forest Rights Committees, NGOs, and other stakeholders to make the approval and rejection process of individual and community land claims under FRA utterly transparent so that these rejected cases can be appealed.

HEALTH

- Understanding the inclusion and coverage status of the Odisha government's Biju Swasthya Kalyan Yojana (BSKY) scheme through a sample survey and secondary data
- Undertaking a state-wide community-led campaign drive for inclusion and coverage of all eligible beneficiaries of the scheme using the feedback redressal mechanism
- Running an effective advocacy campaign to engage policymakers and the state government to increase political and public will toward effective implementation of the BSKY scheme in the state.

EDUCATION

- Building capacities of SMC members and PTAs through meetings and discussions at the village level
- Establishing Model Chatashali in proposed 9 districts in Odisha
- Engaging with volunteers for shared learning and effective functioning of Chatashali
- Highlighting success stories from the ground to create visibility and credibility around the cause

WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

- Conducting a purposive study to take stock of the effectiveness of the Odisha government's <u>Khushi</u> scheme in our Women Centric Village Areas of Sundergarh district in Odisha
- Engaging with schools, colleges, and other institutions to run awareness drives for adolescent girls on sanitary napkins, health, hygiene, etc.
